

Paddy on the Railway: Irish and the Building of



the Great [Western] Massachusetts Railway Wednesday, March 10 6:30 pm- 7:30



Join Storrs Library and Longmeadow Historical Society for a discussion with Dennis Picard on Irish laborers and their role in the building of the Massachusetts Western Railroad in the 19th century. The Western Railroad of Massachusetts was a five-year project charted in February 1833. It linked Boston and Worcester to Springfield, and reached across the Connecticut River to the New York state line. Thousands of skilled and unskilled workers from many different ethnic groups contributed to the labor of this project, with the majority of laborers being of Irish birth or heritage. "Paddy on the Railway" revisits this 1830s construction project and its accomplishments owed to the vast amounts of manual toil, as well as how the Irish, who had been looked down upon by other parts of society, came to be recognized for their contributions to the effort.

Dennis Picard has been a museum professional in the living history field for over 40 years at both Old Sturbridge Village and Storrowton Village Museum. He has authored many articles on the lifestyles and folkways of New England and served as a consultant for historical societies and museums. Dennis is also the host of the "Treasures from the Attic" series with Longmeadow Historical Society and Storrs Library.
